Robert & Barbara Wade Building a Legacy for the Next Generation

Individuals often include a bequest to a local charity as a part of their estate plan; although, non-profit organizations have begun to see an increased trend toward receiving “living gifts”. The recent distributions of personal wealth from Warren Buffett and Bill and Melinda Gates have made international headlines. The distributions received by the Lexington Community Foundation and Elwood Area Community Foundation from Robert “Bob” Wade top our local headlines!

Bob had originally included the distribution of a portion of his assets to create two scholarship funds - one in Lexington and one in Elwood—in his will. Four years ago, he had a change of heart. He decided he wanted to see the impact his money would have; he wanted a chance to know the success stories of the students he helped get a higher education. For the past four years, Lexington Community Foundation and Elwood Area Community Foundation have each received \$10,000. The distributions have created \$40,000 permanent scholarship endowments of the **ROBERT & BARBARA WADE SCHOLARSHIP** at both Foundations.

The scholarship was created and awarded in Lexington for the first time in 2007. The Wades had decided not to require high academic achievement as a requirement for the award stating that academic achievement should obviously be a priority to students, but sometimes it’s the average student that gets overlooked and needs some incentive to reach their academic goals. Bob felt it was important to make this scholarship available to as many students as possible.

In 2008, the scholarship gained another purpose - it was a way to honor Bob’s wife, Barbara. Barbara Wade passed away on May 16, 2008.

The **ROBERT & BARBARA WADE SCHOLARSHIP** is awarded annually to a Lexington High School student who will be attending a public secondary educational institution in the state of Nebraska. The award is valued at \$4,000 - payable \$1,000 per year for up to four years. More information can be found at the Foundation website: www.lexfoundation.org.

Peter Kiewit Foundation Provides Emergency Relief Funding

The magic of giving is certainly felt in Lexington thanks to the generosity of the Peter Kiewit Foundation. The Lexington Community Foundation (LCF) has been chosen by the Peter Kiewit Foundation to receive a \$20,000 emergency relief grant fund to help organizations in this area meet essential human needs, especially during the harsh winter months. The portion of the grant coming to this area is part of \$300,000 the Kiewit Foundation is making available across the state for emergency assistance. This is the second consecutive year that the Peter Kiewit Foundation has offered this grant opportunity and the second year that the LCF has been chosen to receive the funds.

The LCF was chosen based upon a grant application stating the human service needs in this area, to ensure broad geographic distribution, reputation and administrative capacity in order to provide good stewardship of Mr. Kiewit's charitable dollars.

The Peter Kiewit Emergency Relief grant will be distributed between Community Action Partnership of Mid-

Nebraska which will provide food and utility relief to economically challenged households: Haven House which provides temporary shelter and food to individuals: and to the Backpack for Kids program (see next page) administered by the Lexington elementary school principals. Jackie Berke, LCF Executive Director states, "We don't always know the needs of the individuals in our community. It is programs such as this that bring awareness and helps us discover where assistance is needed most. LCF is grateful to the Kiewit Foundation to be chosen for this grant and fortunate to have the opportunity to give back to our community in this way."

Peter Kiewit is a name recognized in this community through the generosity of his Foundation supporting other local projects. Rural Nebraska held a special place in Mr. Kiewit's heart. Today, nearly \$500 million in grants and scholarships has been awarded from the Peter Kiewit Foundation.

Backpacks for Kids

For many Lexington residents, hunger is a harsh reality, especially for children. In the Lexington school district, 74% of students qualify for free and reduced lunch this year. At some of the elementary schools, that number exceeds 90% - meaning that many of their students may not eat well at home, especially on the weekends.

The Peter Kiewit Foundation, Lexington Community Foundation, Plum Creek Market Place, and Wal-Mart Supercenter of Lexington are working with the Lexington elementary school administrators in implementing the Backpacks for Kids program. The program discreetly provides nutritious, child-friendly, easy-to-prepare food to chronically hungry children. The food is packed in everyday backpacks to take home over the weekends and out-of-school times.

IMPLEMENTATION:

Backpacks for Kids is being coordinated by the administration at Morton Elementary with the cooperation of Sandoz, Pershing and Bryan school principals.

Here is how the program works:

- ◆ Food is purchased from Plum Creek Market Place at Affiliated Foods warehouse pricing.
- ◆ On Friday of each week the Lexington High School students who are signed up to be Morton HOST mentors fill the backpacks with a combination of nutritious food for the weekend. (There is no HOSTS mentoring on Fridays).
- ◆ Principals from Sandoz, Pershing and Bryan schools will pick up a designated number of backpacks for the students at their schools.
- ◆ Backpacks are discreetly distributed to the students on Friday afternoon.
- ◆ Backpacks are picked back up on Mondays.

GREATEST CHALLENGE:

The greatest challenge is to determine which students need this support *most*. There is no question that the need is great and some cases are more critical than others. We rely on the school administrators to make this determination.

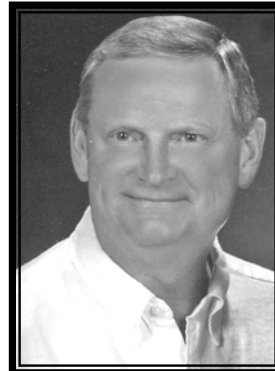
CONTINUING THE TRAIL

Thanks to the vision and advocacy of Larry Roper and Paul Matson, the first 1.1 mile phase of the Johnson Lake Trails, which runs from the outlet canal, through the Game & Parks campground to the public swimming beach, was completed in 2005. Its frequent use by the public bears testimony of the validity of the vision.

The second phase was constructed in 2009. Central Nebraska Public Power and Irrigation District (CNPPID) took the initiative for the planning of the 1.4-mile segment of the trail along their E-65 canal right-of-way. Funding came from CNPPID with assistance from the **Lexington Community Foundation**, Tri-Basin NRD, and private donations. The trail, which will be dedication on Memorial Day 2010, is named in memory of Paul Matson, who chaired the first trails committee. This section of the trail offers a safe recreation space for lake residents, campers, and visitors.

With the ultimate goal of offering a beautiful and safe ten-mile route for hikers and bikers around the lake, this latest addition can jump start planning and funding to continue the trail. Plans are being made to connect the two Game & Parks campgrounds with a trail across or near the two dams . . . and then to extend the trail across the inlet and outlet canals to offer access to all lake residents to public facilities and commercial establishments on all sides of the lake.

Individuals can donate to the trails fund through the **Lexington Community Foundation**. Corporate and family sponsorships are eligible at various levels. Memorials and Honor Gifts can be made in honor of loved ones. Small gifts are welcome and important. The trail design also offers opportunities for large memorial designations - for bridges, rest areas, vista shelters, etc. All contributions are tax deductible through the Foundation.



The second phase of the Johnson Lake Trail is named in memory of Paul Matson, who chaired the first trails committee. Dedication is scheduled for Memorial Day—Monday, May 31st.

YMCA Receives Grant Funding

The YMCA of Lexington Founders Campaign received a boost with the notification of four grants totaling \$62,000. The grant funds will be used to start YMCA programming in Lexington. Peter Kiewit Foundation gave a \$50,000 challenge grant; Union Pacific Foundation a \$10,000 grant; and the Edward Jones Foundation and Mid-Nebraska Community Foundation each gave \$1,000.

SPECIAL INTEREST FUNDS

Club 180, (www.club180lex.com), a youth club in downtown Lexington, opened in July, 2009, for youth in grades 6-12. A group of Lexington adults spent a couple years working with the Boys and Girls Club of America to try and open a club in Lexington, but chose to open one on their own. The name, Club 180, is derived from the vision to help turn youths' lives around 180 degrees for the better, and to prevent youth from turning their lives 180 degrees for the worse. Membership is \$5 a year. Currently, there are 116 members with 20-25 who drop in daily.



The club, at the corner of 7th and Madison Streets, offers a place for students to meet friends and use pool tables, foosball, two Wii stations, a large screen TV with couches, a bank of computers, conference table, board games and a café area with round tables. A program committee, with volunteers, has offered sessions on cooking low-cost nutritional meals, beginning finances, scrapbooking and drug and alcohol prevention, and seasonal parties.

Lisa Romeo, a former 10 year veteran of the Dawson County Sheriff Department, is the Director. She brings to her job a passion for helping youth learn to make solid choices in their lives and is committed to Club 180's goal of providing a place for youth that is fun, positive and safe. Heather Cronkhite works part-time and they both work with dedicated volunteers. The club is open after school and into the evenings, afternoon/evening on Saturdays, and is closed Wednesdays and Sundays. A Board of Directors meets monthly. Funding is through grants and donations.



The Welcome Center, Lexington's immigration center, is found within Lutheran Family Services (LFS) in the Lexington Business Center. It has a private entrance at 205 W. 6th St. Both Ana Castaneda, the immigration specialist, and the location are certified with the Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA). Ana received extensive education and training in immigration law and has the back-up of LFS's immigration attorney in Omaha. She has AmeriCorps staff as funds allow.

Maintaining or adjusting immigration status is complicated. The Welcome Center provides low cost, reliable, legal assistance for naturalization, citizenship, work authorization, refugee/asylee adjustment, permanent residence, temporary protected status, travel documents and more. These services provide stability to individuals and families which benefit the community's schools, employers and neighborhoods. Ana assisted 164 clients in 2008 and 161 new clients in 2009, from over a dozen countries in Central and South America, Africa and Europe

The Welcome Center's vision is to provide more than just immigration services. The bigger dream ... with increased space, staff, and funding ... is to offer cultural orientation, life skill training, referral assistance and translation services to newcomers. Some of those services were offered when El Centro de Luterano opened in 1996. It later became El Centro de la Comunidad. Directors retired or moved and the need for certified immigration services grew. The other needs still remain. An advisory council meets monthly via telephone with LFS's immigration attorney.

There are fewer than ten BIA certified immigration specialists in Nebraska. Lexington proudly claims one of them.

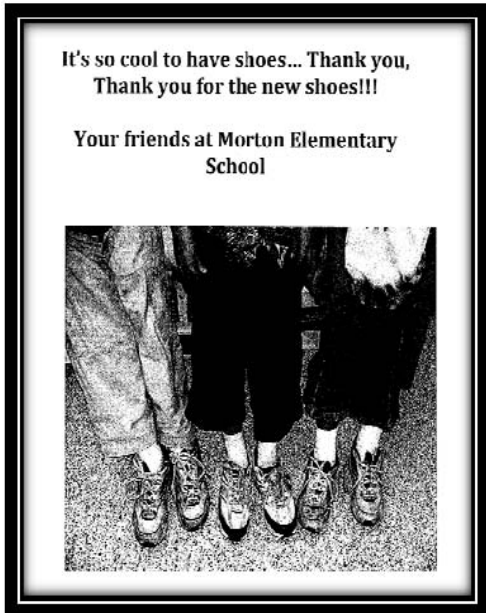
The Lexington Community Foundation has granted more than \$5.6M to projects and programs in Lexington over the past 10 years - an average of \$565,453 per year.
